## Glenn Smith of Payson named District Governor Nominee Designate

They have all had Glenn Smith on their Board of Direc-

tors for at least five of the last 10 years. But Glenn has just received a higher calling: He has been named the "District Governor Nominee Designate." In plain English that means he will be the District Governor following District Governor-Elect Nominee Ken Oakes.

Glenn graduated from CSU in Ft. Collins, Colorado, with a degree in Business Administration, and began a career in public finance as the Comptroller for the City of Ft. Collins. He worked there for 13 years, then moved to Cortez, Colorado, in the Four-Corners area, and worked for the City of Cortez for eight

years. This was followed by a move to Aurora, Colorado, for a 10-year directorship of their finance office.

He moved to Florence, Arizona, for a year-and-a-half to direct the finances of that town. It was there that his new Town Manager invited/ordered him to attend a Rotary meeting. He's been in Rotary ever since.

From Florence he moved to Payson where he was the Town's Chief Financial Officer for 11 years.

Glenn retired in June, 2007, after more than 40 years in public service. His retirement has allowed him to more fully pursue his love of photography. He is a contributing member of the "Artists of the Rim Fine Art Gallery."

When Glenn moved to Payson the town had one Rotary club, the Rotary Club of Payson. As the town and the club grew, the need for a second club became obvious to ***Please continue reading on page 8***

# Lee visits young heart patients in India

In the January issue of *The Rotarian* magazine the following article underscored the significance and importance of Gift of Life by our RI President-elect, Doug Kurn Lee.

Mohd Ayud Bhatt was moved to tears of joy when RI President-Elect Dong Kurn Lee chatted with his seven-year-old son, Amir, who was recovering at a hospital in India from heart surgery funded by Rotarians.

Amir had suffered from an acute upper respiratory tract infection that had spread to his heart. Without surgery, the infection would have been fatal. Bhatt couldn't afford the cost of the procedure and postoperative treatment, so the *Gift of Life program in Delhi, founded and operated by Rotarians*, paid for Amir's care as well as for heart surgeries for five other children.

Lee, who visited Amir and the others at the National Heart Institute in New Delhi on August 31st, sees *Gift of Life* as an invaluable initiative. "The life of a child is so important," he says. "Rotary will always continue programs that improve the health and well-being of children."

Past RI Director Sushil Gupta and A.C. Peter, the chief coordinator for *Gift of Life-India*, accompanied Lee on his walk through the hospital as he spoke with each Gift of Life patient and his or her parents.

Afterward, Lee met the doctors and hospital staff to show his appreciation for their work and to emphasize the importance of international partnership. He spoke about *Gift of Life* as a classic example of Rotarians' efforts to promote peace and understanding through international community service.

Many Arizona Rotarians who are not aware that *Gift of Life-Arizona* is a project of the Rotary Clubs of Districts 5490, 5500 and 5510. Since 1985, the GOL-AZ has provided more than 200 life saving heart surgeries to needy children from 21 countries around the world who are suffering from congenital heart defects. Of these children, 22 are from Arizona.



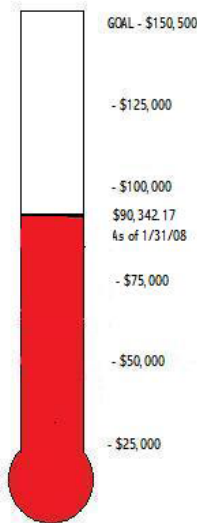

- Save the Family – Mesa
- Dental Care Facilities – Guatemala
- Community Water/Wells – Nepal
- Medicines – Samoa
- Shelter Boxes to Natural Disaster Victims
- Gift of Life – Child Open Heart Surgery
- Society of St. Vincent de Paul
- Wheelchairs – to less developed countries

Many of their project dollars come from selling bratwurst, hot-dogs and cold drinks at their Rotary concession at the two annual Fountain Hills Arts and Crafts fairs. Proceeds from their Spring Fling on March 28 will be the other main source of funds for these service projects.

# 2009-10 Ambassadorial Scholarship applications available

Applications for 2009-10 Rotary Foundation Ambassadorial Scholarships are now available from the District 5510 Ambassadorial Scholarships Committee.

The scholarships, which are designed to further international understanding and goodwill, provide for study abroad in more than 150 countries where Rotary clubs are located. Some 1,300 scholarships of various types will be available from clubs worldwide.

During their studies abroad, Rotary Foundation Ambassadorial Scholars act as "Ambassadors of Goodwill." Through appearances before Rotary clubs and districts, schools, civic organizations and other forums, the scholars represent their homelands and work to further international understanding.

Academic-Year Ambassadorial Scholarships are for one academic year abroad and provide funding for round-trip transportation, tuition and fees, room, board, some educational supplies and language training (if necessary) in the amount of US\$24,000. The scholarship is designed to be a year of study abroad for either a recent college graduate or as part of a current college student's undergraduate studies.

District 5510 currently has three outbound Ambassadorial Scholars representing our district overseas for the 2007-08 academic year. **Erin Mills**, sponsored by Scottsdale Papago and counseled by Carl Couch, is studying in Montevideo, Uruguay. **Reena Patel**, sponsored by Phoenix Squaw Peak and counseled by Lee Raddatz, is studying in Mumbai, India. And **Diane Rish**, sponsored by Carefree/Cave Creek and counseled by Sharon Schiffhauer, is studying in Concepción, Chile.

Three Ambassadorial Scholars have also been selected to represent District 5510 overseas for the 2008-09 academic year. **Annalyn Censky**, sponsored by Phoenix Arcadia and counseled by Walter Thompson, will study in Prague, Czech Republic. **Jessica Gale**, sponsored by Four Peaks and counseled by Cheryl Murray, will study in Buenos Aires, Argentina. And **Emily Winans**, sponsored by Pinnacle Peak and counseled by Chris Schiffhauer, will study in Sao Paulo, Brazil.

In a prior year, Phoenix East Rotary members worked with the Hermosillo Pitic Rotary Club in Mexico and were able to provide the town with a fire truck which proudly displays the Phoenix East Rotary Club symbol.

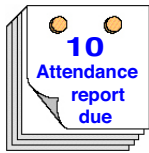
